
Football is Back!!!


parades, comic cons, conventions, birthday parties and many other events.




I want to discuss electric vehicles or EVs. I have kept myself up to date with news about the upcoming EVs for quite a while now. When it comes to EVs, the first company or cars you might think will be made by Tesla. And, for the most part, you will be correct. But now, the market is heading up. Major corporations such as Ford, GM, and Toyota, just to name a few, are gearing up production on electric vehicles. Although Tesla was not the first electric vehicle to be made, the first electric vehicle dates back as early as the 1800s. Still, the company pioneered many new approaches to tackle the current ecosystem. For lack of a better term, I'm a sucker for further technological advancements, but how will these advances help people with disabilities?

According to an article written by Christopher Reardon from The Verge (2021), "when cars were first introduced to the public at the beginning of the 20th century, disabled people were in no way a part of public life, when they were actively excluded from it. The main difference with this chapter on automotive innovation is that it's coming 30 years after the passage of the ADA." A survey that was conducted only included 2,200 people, and 176 considered themselves disabled, "but that might have something to do with EV ownership among the disabled being so low due to income and access." (Reardon, 2021). Many EVs and current gasproduced vehicles aren't built for disabled people. According to the article, a survey response from Mobility in the UK, one reason for inaccessibility at charging stations is the heavy weight of charging cables. "Like cellphone and laptop batteries, high-power charging generates a lot of heat in the cable, which is why they are

typically insulated and liquid-cooled. This makes them heavier and harder to maneuver." (Reardon, 2021). Everyone must have accessibility/accommodations, but with the current issue, it will be a challenging future with more transportation advancements.
